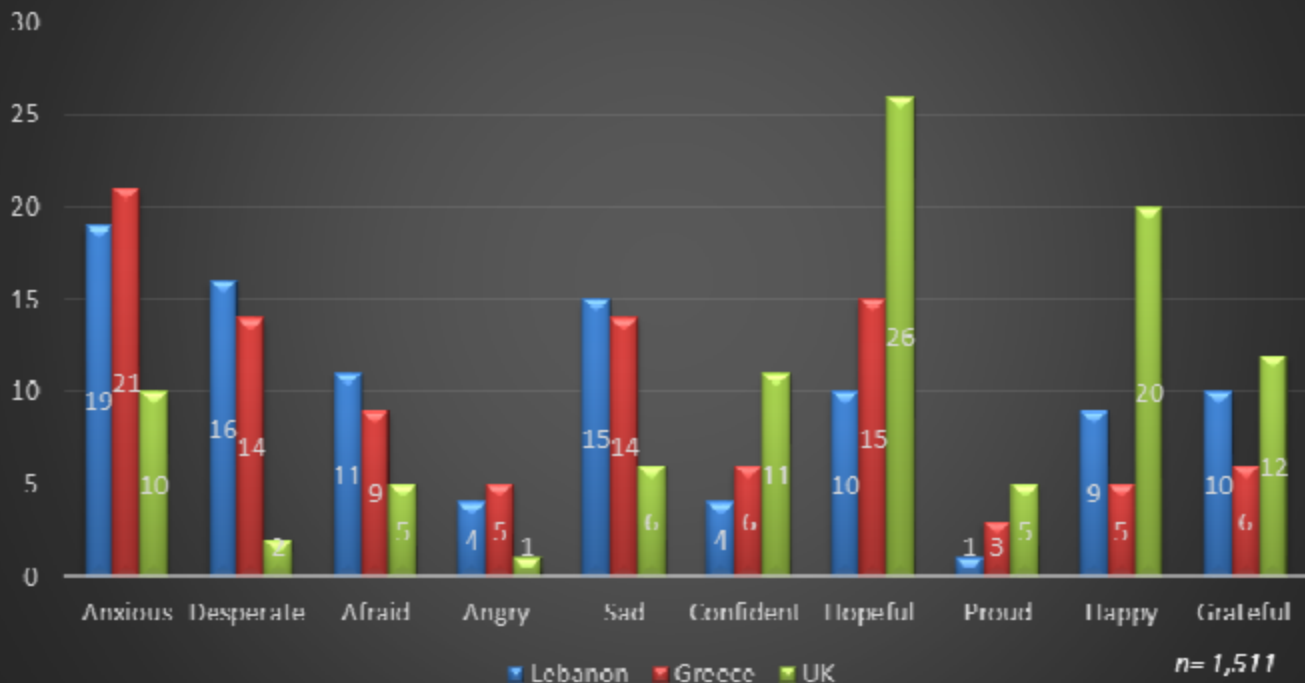


While Syrian refugees in Britain mostly feel hopeful, happy and grateful, those in Greece and Lebanon experience much more anxiety, desperation and fear

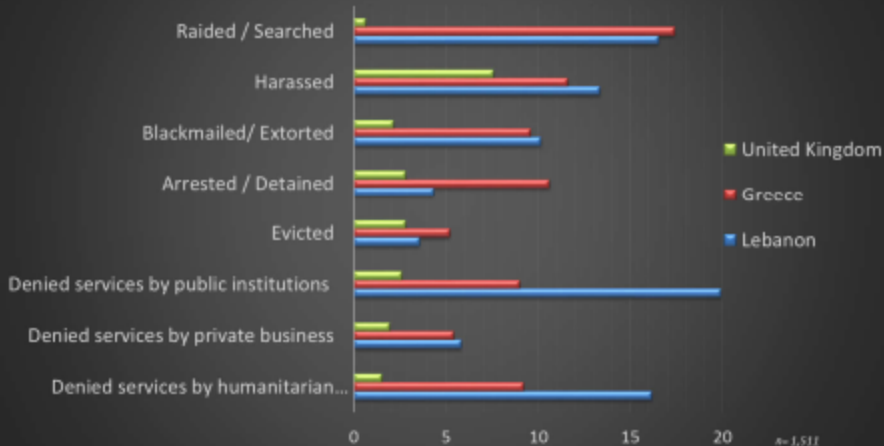
How do you feel about your current situation in host country? (%)
